
Winter PRO Work in Progress

Transport Canada

Notice to Vessel Registry Clients

Transport Canada's Vessel Registry is changing. We will still provide the registry services you need, but from a central office in Ottawa.

This change will take effect in different parts of the country at different times, but the process will be complete across Canada by April 1, 2013.

Once we make changes in **your** region, you will need to send your completed application form and other documents to Transport Canada headquarters in Ottawa. Please keep in mind that it will take time for your documents to reach us once you mail them. It will no longer be possible for us to serve you in person, but we will make every effort to maintain our service standards. You can visit our <u>website</u> to learn more about them.

Transport Canada, Marine Safety and Security, is making changes as part of the federal government's overall plans to reduce the deficit and cut costs. The changes will also allow the department to modernize some of its practices, offer uninterrupted service and provide a single point of access for all Vessel Registry clients.

For now, you can continue to contact your Transport Canada Regional Office about vessel registry. We will let you know when we make changes in your region. We will continue to post changes on this website from time to time for you to view.

As some of you may know, major changes are occurring at the Canadian Registry of Vessels ("CRV"). In an attempt to reduce the deficit through budget cuts, the Federal Government is consolidating the CRV into one office in Ottawa.

This means that the Port of Vancouver CRV office will permanently close on January 1, 2013, and move to Ottawa. The Ottawa office will be secured, meaning that public access for searches and transactions will no longer be possible.

As a further consequence of these budget cuts, we understand that the number of active Registrars will be cut in half; and, registration and verification procedures for Registrars may revert to pen-and-paper based logs. The effect of the changes will be significant delays.

It has been suggested that current processing times at the CRV will double or triple for Vancouver applicants registering new ships, or transferring ownership for existing ships. Furthermore, because the new CRV building will be secure, it will not be possible for any member of the public to attend the CRV upon closing to exchange a ship's registration for payment, as has been common in the past.

What is the solution to these impending changes?

We suggest that contracts of purchase and sale for vessels include holdback amounts and holdback periods which would ideally account for the expected increase in processing delays at the CRV. We also suggest that, like the current real estate practice of mutual undertakings between the vendor's and the purchaser's solicitors regarding the discharge of mortgages on the sale of real property, the parties to a ship sale mutually undertake to hold back appropriate monies and agree to vary or void a transfer of ownership if the CRV eventually rejects the documents or does not complete registration within the time agreed to between the parties.

Please note that online searches of the CRV should still be possible in order to determine the registration status of a vessel.





Santa's Christmas Ships Cruise

The whole thing was started by the Baird brothers, Bill & Buss in the late 50s-early 60s, who would put Christmas trees on their three tugs and go around Port Moody harbor. Then one by one local boaters joined in.

Back in the day Port Moody City had the "Christmas Tree Lighting Ceremony". Hundreds of people would show up. The crowd would fill the pier. They had a big bonfire, decorations, and everything. Rod McVickor would get a barge, tow it into Port Moody, and he would take local high school kids to the barge and they would sing Christmas chorales, and CKNW would broadcast them over the radio. There were only 1 or 2 boats like ours involved and we would take Santa into the old dock in Port Moody then take a quick tour up to the Ioco boat club and back home. In the Rod McVickor days when CKNW was broadcasting over the radio we could all tune in. It put all of us on the same page so to speak. Some of the high school choirs were very good and

Port Moody's bon fire was as big as the one at Deep Cove. Our Santa's name at that time was Bob Banford who is now passed on. Another active couple at that time were Ron and Tomie Curties. His boat had 5 bells in lights and had them sequenced to blink on and off, cool for the day. Dennis Hewson one year had his decorations green on the starboard side and red on the port so he looked like two different boats coming or going. The longest line of ships I can remember went from Kates Park up and through Deep Cove and back to Belcarra Park. My guess is about 80 ships in all.

Then, requirements and things like liability insurance kicked in and the Barge, Kids, CKNW and Rod went away. [Before] the Ships from Vancouver would show up take a quick turn around and leave. At that time there were dozens of them. With the introductions of schedules rules and too much "requirements" their numbers decreased down to 1 or 4 boats.







Galley Grits



Sea of Rice



Many meals from few ingredients makes rice a great galley provision for easy cooking on a boat. Use cooked rice, and hearty meals are **ready in 10** minutes using just a skillet, or saucepan, or no cooking at all. Here are few smart ideas to turn cooked rice into dinner! Substitute or add any ingredients as you have available or like instead.

1 Mushroom Risotto













Sauté a wild mushroom mix with garlic in olive oil. Stir in cooked rice with cream of mushroom soup and a splash of white wine or chicken broth to make creamy. Sprinkle with parmesan cheese & serve.

2 Bean Burritos











Spread refried beans over a flour tortilla, then top with shredded cheese, cooked rice, and salsa. Roll up and wrap in foil to heat in oven until cheese melts. Serve with optional sour cream.

3 Ouick Paella













Sauté chopped onion red pepper & garlic in hot olive oil. Stir in Creole seasoning, salt, pepper cooked rice, cubes of cooked ham or sausage, canned (or fresh) cut up tomatoes & frozen peas. Heat through and sprinkle with chopped cilantro or parsley.

4 Shrimp Fried Rice













Scramble & cook 2 eggs in olive oil and remove. Add more olive oil and sauté chopped onion. Add thawed frozen Asian vegetables and cooked rice; heat through. Stir in cooked shrimp, teriyaki sauce to taste, & scrambled eggs; heat through. Serve topped with peanuts and sliced scallions if desired.

5 Rum Raisin Rice Pudding











Soak raisins in rum 20 minutes. In a medium-size saucepan over low heat, bring 1 cup milk, spoonful honey, and pinch salt to nearly scalding Add 1 cup cooked rice and continue cooking over low heat, stirring occasionally, for 10 minutes, until rice is creamy and tender; adjust creaminess & sweetness to taste. Remove from the heat and stir in the rum-soaked raisins, along with splash of vanilla extract. Chill or serve warm sprinkled with cinnamon if desired.
