## THE MAREP REPORT

Fall can be one of the most rewarding times for boating, assuming that one is not attempting to venture very far afield. A September or October overnight anchorage in a favourite Howe Sound or Indian Arm spot can be sunny, clear, quiet and uncrowded – but check the 48 hour weather forecast first! That lovely weather can deteriorate rather quickly (usually in the middle of the night) if a frontal system decides to march onto the coast. Cool, still weather and a moist air-mass can also lead to fog, which really fouls up that planned early departure.


Monitor the pressure changes shown by your vessel's barometer over 3 hour time periods, watch the characteristics of approaching frontal clouds) and note wind shifts. Remember that in our waters a wind shift into the southeast usually presages an approaching frontal system, along with dropping barometric pressure and thickening clouds from the west. Pay attention, and you will have lots of time to clean up, weigh anchor and run home easily before things get dirty.

As part of your planning, log onto the Environment Canada Web Site (www.weatheroffice.ec.gc.ca), go to "Text Forecasts" on the upper left of the Home Page, and select the "Coastal BC Marine Synopsis and Forecast". This will give you the latest 24 hour forecast, plus an outlook for the following 24 hours, in understandable format.

However, for additional information and a bird's eye view of expected pressure pattern changes and frontal systems, go to "Aviation Weather", also on the upper left of the Home Page. This will put you into Nav Canada's Web Site. Scroll down to the bottom to "Other Links" and select "American Data (ADDS)". You will then be connected to the "Aviation Digital Data Service". Select "Prog Charts" on the Menu Bar and be impressed by simple full colour charts which will portray snapshots of the next 48 hours at 12 hour intervals.

I have shown an example of how things looked for Labour Day and the day after. If you check the site and see lots of dark green and a big red "L" in our area, go directly to your favorite video store, buy popcorn, and stay home! If things look favourable, we'll share a bottle of wine with you at anchor in Centre Bay.

### Desolation Sound Cruise – Aug 2<sup>nd</sup> to Aug 11<sup>th</sup> ... and beyond!

Friday, August 2<sup>nd</sup> marked the start of the much awaited Desolation Sound cruise. Some of us would come home saying it was the best cruise ever, while others would come back swearing it was jinxed. This trip had an unusually high number of boats with problems ranging from the most serious, a "leg replacement," to something as simple as "putting water in the battery." Despite these problems, the trip was fantastic and we had a great turn out of 19 boats in all.

Our first stop was on Friday at Gibsons. About fourteen boats arrived and we spent the night chatting and laughing on the docks. Everyone was so excited about the trip ahead. The next morning, we left for Westview Beach Gardens Marina. Unfortunately, our first boat casualty of the trip surfaced. Kerry and Shelly's boat, Zippity-Doo-Dah, started to have problems with the leg and they had to turn back. It was a crushing disappointment for Kerry and Shelly as they had been so looking forward to the trip. We all felt so disappointed that they were not able to come. The trip just wasn't the same without them.

Most of the squadron stayed at Westview Beach Gardens on Saturday night. Some of us braved the dark and walked along the beach to Grief Point to watch the fireworks. I'm sure we all woke up around 4 am when the thunder and lightening started. The coast guard had stopped by earlier that day and warned of the pending storm.

The next morning, the weather was rainy but it didn't dampen our spirits. After a short stop in Lund to restock with supplies (*The Tranquilizer* had run out of party ice and this qualifies as an *emergency*), it was on to Desolation Sound. Our first stop was beautiful Prideaux Haven for our first raft-up at Cobblestone Point. Some of us dodged the showers and went out to explore the cove in our dingies that first day. The next day, we were supposed to go to Pendrell Sound for a warm-water swim but the weather was not cooperating so half of the group stayed another night in Prideaux Haven and the other half spent the night in Roscoe Bay. There was a 6-dingy raft-up in Prideaux Haven the second night. While tied together, we travelled to Laura Cove and on the way attracted quite an audience from other boats at anchor.

On Tuesday morning, we left for a stop in Refuge Cove for supplies (more ice for Lou and Deb). This is one of the busiest places in Desolation Sound. There is a great general store with groceries, books, gifts, liquor store, laundry and hot showers. Then it was on to Teakerne Arm. We rafted up in "Good Sex Cove" and enjoyed an afternoon of swimming and socializing. The next morning we dingied over to Cassel Falls and hiked up to Cassel Lake for a freshwater swim.

We departed on Wednesday afternoon to head north through the "Hole in the Wall" and on to the Octopus Islands. As we arrived, Dave Sheppard and Steve Van Gaalen organized the ultimate "regulation" raft-up of 16 boats. I believe we thoroughly impressed the Langley Squadron (aka the Burnaby Squadron?? - we never did get a definitive answer) as they watched from their tiny raft-up. That night we orchestrated the largest dingy raft-up yet. Up to twelve dingies were tied together and drew cheers from the other boats at anchor as we did our amazing double-axle pirouettes. It was a thing of beauty. The PMS dingy drill team raft-up broke up after a rowdy water fight broke out between the Sheppards and the Langley squadron.

The next morning, the raft-up dispersed and we were on our way south through Surge Narrows for the scenic journey down to Gorge Harbour, Cortez Island for an overnight stay at the dock. A few members stopped at Rebecca Spit Marine Park beforehand, but the rest of us were anxious to get settled at the dock and have a long, much-needed shower.

Friday morning, the bulk of the squadron left to go to Garden Bay Marina on Pender Island. What started out as Gary and Cheryl McGuire picking up boat repair parts turned into a new PMS destination, much to their delight. We all went for an early dinner in the Garden Bay restaurant. It was a night for people watching, or better yet yacht watching as the 155 foot *Tamsen* sailboat pulled up to the dock opposite *Restless Too*, *Marry Me* and *On A Bubble*. Some of our members tried to think up ways of getting invited aboard for a tour but it never materialized. For a while, there seemed to be a crowd around the *Bubble*. I bet some of those people aboard the *Tamsen* wished they were on the more relaxing *Bubble* with its comfy new hammock and wide selection of inflatable water toys.

After being on the go for most of the trip, we all decided to stay another day at Pender Harbour. Some of us walked up to a local lake for a swim. We had a delicious pot-luck "appy" dinner followed by a short session of guitar playing by yours truly (after being bugged about not playing, I finally caved). We tried to sing a rendition of "Dave Tripper" sung to the Beatles tune "Day Tripper." Later we all went to the pub to celebrate Grace's birthday. It was a fun time with lots of dancing and partying. Things got out of hand when some of the women in the group, "for no reason," turned their shirts inside-out right there at the table! As usual, PMS was the life of the party.

On Sunday morning, we sadly left Pender Harbour leaving behind Dave Attewell who was joining Vera that morning. It's a good thing too because now he didn't need to keep borrowing Dave Burrell's air pump to keep his "inflatable" pumped up. This morning the squadron encountered the first rough water of the trip. It got so bad that *On A Bubble* and *The Tranquilizer* had to stay the night at Secret Cove. *Just Coastin'* was the only boat that made it all the way home that day after encountering 8 foot seas off Point Atkinson and stopping to help rescue a man in the water at Lions Gate. *Restless Too*, *Off Course* and *The Great Escape* made it to Snug Cove on Bowen Island.

All in all, it was a wonderful trip with a fantastic group of friends. I think most of us felt sad to be going home. I find myself already looking forward to next year's cruises. See you on the water!


