The Marine Maintenance Course

The full enjoyment of boating includes the pleasure of using your boat and the satisfaction of properly maintain it.

All boats need maintenance to correct for the gradual deterioration from wear and tear and the exposure to the elements.

The Marine Maintenance course covers general maintenance, the hull, the electrical system, lubrication, seasonal maintenance, painting tips, engine cooling, ignition and much more.

From spark plugs to bottom paint, the Marine Maintenance course covers all the basics for boater.

SEAMANSHIP

(Formerly Piloting)



The new full colour Seamanship Course builds on some of the techniques introduced in the Boating Course. Seamanship uses traditional navigation, GPS fixes, way points, along with the introduction of deviation.

Seamanship explains the skills needed to understand the hazards of weather, wind, waves, tides and tidal currents and how to deal with them.

When unforeseen circumstances arise such as man-overboard and medical emergencies the Seamanship Course teaches how to acquire the skills to deal with potentially life-threatening situations.

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Protecting the marine environment is a shared responsibility.

Every boat has an environmental impact.

It is up to skippers and crews, all of us who boat, to make certain that our marine environment stays clean.

The environmental impact of boating can be large or small, depending on our actions. We need to make sure we have a minimal impact on the environment so our waters will remain pure and safe for the enjoyment of all who use them. We boaters have as much to lose as anyone if our waters become polluted.

Environmental issues related to boating activity fall into five main categories:

- Handling of fuels, lubricants, and coolants
- Discharge of sewage or noxious grey water
- Boat maintenance
- Protection of in-shore habitats
- Applicable marine laws

Read: The Marine Environment - A Shared Responsibility

A document that has been prepared by the Squadron Environment Officers of Pacific Mainland District, Canadian Power and Sail Squadrons, to be used as a tool to educate students, members and others in their responsibilities to the environment in whichtheir boats are operated.
